

Field Day Traditions 1975-2019



The equipment is stowed away, the overnight crew is caught up on missed sleep, the score is calculated and submitted to the ARRL and we can now mark the 45th field day notch on our mics and paddles. And the 2019 field day review is now at hand.

This year we will break the routine and revive a forgotten graphic illustration of past OBARC field days, the historic "White Board". The original White Board (1975-1995) created by N2OO was a post field day meeting tradition. After field day it was appended to incorporate the current year statistics. I have rejuvenated The White Board, expanding vital field day information and added field day 1996 through 2018. It awaits our 2019 class 3E rank from the ARRL so we can insert the 45th row of field day statistics. The White Board reveals the remarkable OBARC field day saga though the decades.

At the August meeting, we will review field day 2019. But the program will not be limited to a trite photo sequence of towers, dipoles or field day paraphernalia. It will be the untold tale of OBARCs field day planning, efficiency and the resulting exceptional and consistent scoring performance over four and a half decades. More than just the 2019 score, this year's presentation is a trip down Field Day road, a site seeing tour, examining our 2019 statistics, analyzing the 20 year national trends in field day, reflecting on our remarkable 45 year showing, witness those "Present at the Creation", highlight the "First Field Day", uncover the long "Lost Field Day" and display the sites and members of field days past. If I have not yet fueled your interest, the recently discovered OBARC archive of iconic field day photos, newspaper articles and other documents should stir your curiosity. And don't forget about N2OOs historic White Board. The Official 45-year OBARC White Board souvenir is available to all past and current members present at the August meeting. Come out and see the history many of you and your fellow members crafted.




Ocean County ARES® News – August 2019

The "Introduction to Emergency Communication" (EC-001) course was developed by the ARRL for amateur radio emergency communicators. It was primarily offered as an on-line course with mentors assisting participants and the online version requires several weeks to complete.

As part of the 2019 ARES Plan the course is now offered free and is required for individuals desiring to achieve Level II or III ARES Qualifications.

A pilot, classroom course, was approved by N2XW and was presented this month at the Ocean County EOC. Nine students attended, several from out of Ocean County. The course instructors were N2RPQ, N2XW and WB2ALJ. The course was split into five evening sessions with the last on July 22nd. In the immediate future, EC-016 – "Public Service and Emergency Communications Management for Radio Amateurs" will also be presented in a similar fashion.

The next meeting of Ocean County ARES will be Wednesday Evening, August 21 at 7:00 PM, Ocean County EOC, Robert J. Miller Airpark. There will be no ARES training net that evening due to the meeting.

Adoption of the following standards as THE ARES uniform clothing to begin being worn on deployments beginning summer 2010 and replacing all other items, is a major positive step in ARRL/ARES public relations.

ARES members, while activated, deployed or otherwise on duty shall wear over their normal apparel, at minimum, a florescent green ANSI Class 2 reflective, 100% polyester vest.

Because the size of the printable space on vests can vary with the size of the vest itself, use the largest size Arial Black font possible up to 2" high lettering, black in color, imprinted above the horizontal reflective tape and centered in the back between any vertical reflective tape.

AMATEUR RADIO EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS

Those in a leadership position may add their title (SEC, DIRECTOR, EC, PIO, etc) below Emergency Communications in not less than 3" tall font, black.

Local jurisdictions may elect to add their organization name above Emergency Communications with no larger than 1" Arial Black lettering, color black.

On the Left Chest, the ARES logo, minimum 3-inch diameter, black in color, negative background. The Right Chest shall remain blank to allow wearer to affix their ARES or ARRL name badge.

Happy 150! The Hiram Percy Maxim Birthday Celebration!

As announced in September 2019 QST - page 86
This year marks the 150th anniversary of the birth of the League's first president and cofounder, Hiram Percy Maxim (HPM), W1AW. HPM was born on September 2, 1869. As we have done with earlier birthday milestones, ARRL is again holding an operating event to celebrate HPM's legacy.

Objective: This operating event is open to all amateurs, and the goal is straightforward: Find stations operating in the event, many adding "/150" to their call signs, and contact as many as possible during the 9-day celebration.

Time Period: The 9-day event begins 0000 UTC August 31 and runs until 2359 UTC September 8, 2019.

Eligibility: All amateur stations may participate.

Who is eligible to use their "callsign/150"? W1AW and ALL ARRL members are eligible and will append /150 to their call sign during this event (this includes DX Stations who are ARRL members, who may operate as callsign/150 if permitted by the regulations of their country of license).

The classroom version of EC-001 takes the online material as its base and uses the instructor's knowledge of the subject along with their personal experiences to elaborate on each topic. It was designed for those who prefer the classroom environment over that of online training. The initial pilot class was held over 5 nights with the first 4 being instruction and the final night being the testing. We anticipate adjusting this schedule now that the pilot class has shown us where we need to expand or condense certain topics.

The team is planning on hosting additional course in different areas of the Southern NJ section in the future. We would like to thank the Ocean County Sherriff's department for graciously offering their Emergency Operations Center Training Room for us to conduct this class.

The team is additionally just completing the curriculum for EC-016. In the near future we plan on holding a pilot class for that program as well.
